





WHEREAS, volunteers are vital to our future as a caring and productive nation; and





WHEREAS, every business, industry, school and citizen can make a difference when it comes to conserving water; and


WHEREAS, every business, industry, school and citizen can help by saving water and thus promote a healthy economy and community.

CITY OF TAMARAC REGULAR CITY COMMISSION MEETING WEDNESDAY, MARCH 26, 2014

CALL TO ORDER: Mayor Harry Dressler called the Regular Commission Meeting of the City of Tamarac to order at 9:04 a.m. on Wednesday, March 26, 2014 in City Commission Chambers, Tamarac City Hall, 7525 NW 88th Avenue, Tamarac, FL 33321.

ROLL CALL: Mayor Harry Dressler, Vice Mayor Michelle J. Gomez, Commissioner Pamela Bushnell, Commissioner Diane Glasser and Commissioner Debra Placko were in attendance.

Also in attendance were Assistant City Manager Diane Phillips, City Attorney Samuel Goren and City Clerk Patricia Teufel.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE: Vice Mayor Gomez led the Pledge of Allegiance.

- 1. PROCLAMATIONS AND PRESENTATIONS:
- a. Presentation of a proclamation by Mayor Harry Dressler proclaiming March 2014 as "March for Meals Month". (Requested by Mayor Harry Dressler)
- 2. CITY COMMISSION REPORTS:
- a. Commissioner Bushnell: Commissioner Bushnell said that thirty years ago she delivered Meals on Wheels and brought her daughter with her to introduce her to people who were in need of company. Commissioner Bushnell noted that last week was the first class for Tamarac University after which she received a call from one of the participants who said it was a great experience. Commissioner Bushnell reported that the 1st District Neighborhood meeting was held on March 19th and 160 people were in attendance; attended the Bike Rodeo at the Community Center last Saturday and a ribbon cutting ceremony at the Alzheimer Unit at Horizon Bay.
- b. Vice Mayor Gomez: Vice Mayor Gomez said she met Meals on Wheels Executive Director Mark Adler a few months ago where they talked about also bringing food for pets and hoped that the Kiwanis Club is encouraging people to donate pet food as well. Vice Mayor Gomez said she missed the last meeting because she was in Washington, D.C. attending the National League of Cities National Conference as well as other meetings with Congressman Hastings and Senator Nelson. Vice Mayor Gomez mentioned that she is also on the National Transportation Steering Committee. Vice Mayor Gomez said she attended the State of the County address last week, the Bike Rodeo, the 2014 Miss Broward County Scholarship Pageant, the Emerald Society Breakfast and Career Day at Millennium Middle School. Vice Mayor Gomez welcomed Commissioner Placko to the dais. Vice Mayor Gomez said the next Coffee with the Vice Mayor will be on Sunday, March 30th from 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. at the Tamarac Diner, McNab and Nob Hill Rds. Vice Mayor Gomez encouraged people to contact the Commission with any questions or concerns they may have and also invited people to attend the District 2 Neighborhood Meeting on April 30th at 6:30 p.m. at the Lime Bay Auditorium.
- c. Commissioner Glasser: Commissioner Glasser said people think that nothing is going on at the Tamarac Village site, however, a lot of work has to be done before the first shovel goes

into the ground and people need to be patient. Commissioner Glasser said if anyone has questions to please contact her.

Commissioner Dressler asked if Tamarac Village was discussed at the District 1 Neighborhood meeting and Assistant City Manager Phillips replied that it had not been discussed. Mayor Dressler said Tamarac Village, as well as the Community Development District, should be brought up at future meetings and an article should appear in the Tam-A-Gram.

- d. Commissioner Placko: Commissioner Placko noted that the District 4 Neighborhood Meeting is scheduled for May 7th at 6:30 p.m. at the Community Center. Commissioner Placko reported that on Monday evening she attended the WPOA meeting and the guest speaker was Planning & Zoning Manager Frank Zickar where he discussed the new signage that will be used throughout Tamarac. Commissioner Placko said the City has invested a lot of time in her education by meeting with each department head and found them to be very professional and progressive. Commissioner Placko noted that she had no idea of what goes on behind the scenes and looks forward to meeting with the rest of the Executive Team next week.
- e. Mayor Dressler: Mayor Dressler said he found it interesting that we did a proclamation for Meals on Wheels because he just wrote an article for Sunday's Sun-Sentinel's South Florida100 feature about the surge in the price of food and the impact of inflation on families. Mayor Dressler spoke about manufacturer's reducing the quantity of their products. Mayor Dressler said by Tamarac supporting organizations like Meals on Wheels it helps bring dignity to people. Mayor Dressler added that people need to get involved in their community as the need will be increasing.
- 3. CITY ATTORNEY REPORT: City Attorney Goren reported that on Friday, April 4th at 9:00 a.m. at the Governmental Center, Suite 122, the Broward League of Cities (BLC) will be conducting an ethics seminar for all elected officials which will earn attendees 2 hours of ethics credits. Jamie Cole will give an overview of the Ethics Ordinance, Patricia McDougal, who is a parliamentarian, will talk about Roberts Rules of Order and City Attorney Goren said he will be talking about the Sunshine Law and public records.

City Attorney Goren said Commissioner Bushnell is on the Ethics Task Force which made a recommendation to the BLC that the BLC Directors send a letter to the Mayor of Broward County seeking collaboration between the BLC and the Board of County Commissioners on a review of the Ethics Code itself and to look at aspects and areas within the Code that could be changed. The County Liaison attended the last Ethics Task Force meeting and put it on the record that the County Administrator is committed to this process. City Attorney Goren said that on Wednesday, April 16th at 10:00 a.m. in Room 430 of the Governmental Center the Inspector General Selection and Oversight Committee (IGSOC) will meet to review the existing ethics structure in Broward County and its municipalities. The Inspector General report that was issued earlier this year is on their agenda and there will be an initial discussion by the committee members, further input from the Inspector General John Scott, presentation by BLC President Susan Starkey, comments and questions from the general public and the final discussion by committee members and promulgation and/or adoption of the committees position. City Attorney Goren said the IG is a Charter Officer and the IGSOC oversees his performance.

City Attorney Goren said his firm has been tracking some legislation that deals with local government issues and they have a 42 page document, which is different than the lobbyist's report, which he will share with the Commission next week. City Attorney Goren talked briefly about some of the legislation that is being tracked.

Commissioner Bushnell said the last recommendation of the Ethics Task Force was to meet with the Broward County Commission and has not heard anything about a meeting being scheduled. Commissioner Bushnell asked City Attorney Goren if he thought they were also waiting for the outcome of the meeting on April 16th. City Attorney Goren responded that as of yesterday the County Commission has not yet responded but what is important is that on the agenda for the April 16th ISGOC meeting there are two potential speakers: Joseph Centorino, Executive Director of Miami-Date Ethics Commission, and Robert Meyers, Partner in the law firm of Weiss Serota and a member of the Ethics Task Force. City Attorney Goren said he will be in attendance at that meeting.

4. ASSISTANT CITY MANAGER REPORT: Assistant City Manager Phillips said the Building Department launched the E-Permits System on March 3rd which allows customers to submit, and staff to review, building permits electronically and out of the 321 permits received 246 were submitted electronically. Assistant City Manager Phillips said the City Clerk's Office is pleased to announce that Acting Assistant City Clerk Lillian Pabon has earned the designation of Certified Municipal Clerk awarded by the International Institute of Municipal Clerks.

Assistant City Manager Phillips said Information Technology reports that the Building Inspectors, Code Enforcement Officers, Public Services and Fire Rescue Staff now have full access to the City's network from the field via any laptop or tablet with an internet connection. This removes the obstacles in accessing information and enables a true mobile office environment during routine and emergency operations. Assistant City Manager Phillips noted that multiple Tamarac technology projects are being showcased by the Florida League of Cities Innovations Showcase which highlights the use of technology within local governments. This information can be viewed on the Innovation Showcase Website.

Upcoming Events: The Concert in the Park featuring "Shadow Creek" will be held on Friday, March 28th at the Sports Complex from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.; the Community Garage Sale will be held on Saturday, April 5th at Tamarac Park from 7:30 a.m. to noon and the Springfest will take place on Saturday, April 12th at the Sports Complex from 10:00 a.m. to noon with the Egg Hunt starting promptly at 10:00 a.m.

5. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION: Mayor Dressler opened Public Participation and the following individuals spoke: Patti Lynn, 641 NW 58th St., welcomed Commissioner Placko; thanked the Commission for the proclamation for Women's History Month; supports red light cameras; asked staff to remind residents that charges for stormwater are now on their tax bills; asked staff to look into the tractor trailers that are parking on a lot on 57th Street east of University and said she is not happy that people who have opened campaign accounts are not attending the meetings. Joel Davidson, 4608 Norfolk Island Pine Dr., said the Kiwanis Club will have a booth at the Garage Sale on April 5th where they will be selling items to benefit the "Eliminate Project" and they will also be collecting food. Mr. Davidson thanked Vice Mayor Gomez for being a member of the Kiwanis Club and welcomed Mayor Dressler as a new

- member. Mr. Davidson said the Democratic Club and the Historical Society will also have booths at the Garage Sale and asked people to donate any Tamarac memorabilia to the Historical Society that they might have. With no one else wishing to speak, Mayor Dressler closed Public Participation
- 6. Issue: Property owner, Howard Bird is seeking to sell property located at 2801 N.W. 51st Place, in the City of Tamarac. While the title work for the subject property was being reviewed, Counsel for Mr. Bird was advised that a small portion of the subject property encroached onto the city's public right of way.

<u>Background:</u> The encroachment in question is a sliver of property running adjacent to the property owner's exterior property line (see attachment) beginning on the south side of the property running along the entire easterly property line. Staff estimates that the owner's property line has encroached upon the city's right of way for as long as the structure has been on the property. In an effort to sell the property and deliver "clear title", counsel for the owner is requesting that the City enter into an encroachment agreement with Mr. Bird, to allow Mr. Bird and the prospective buyer to continue to encroach upon the right of way.

<u>Analysis:</u> Staff has reviewed the encroachment and the public right of way in question and finds that there are no impediments or utilities that would prevent continued encroachment upon the right of way. Further, Mr. Bird has agreed to maintain the property consistent with the City's Code of Ordinances.

<u>Summary of Recommendation:</u> Staff recommends that the Mayor and City Commission pass the proposed resolution authorizing the encroachment agreement to allow for the continued encroachment of property located at 2801 N.W 51s Place to encroach unto the City's right of way.

<u>Fiscal Impact:</u> There will be no direct budgetary impact.





<u>Background:</u> On September 7, 2010, the City Commission approved Ordinance 2010-017, defining a process for appointments to certain advisory boards and committees. On June 8, 2011 the City Commission approved Resolution R2011-58 appointing five regular members to the Public Art Committee. Marilyn Freire, an applicant appointed to serve as a regular member to the Public Art Committee resigned leaving a vacancy of one regular member on the Committee.

The City Clerk's Office ran two advertisements in the Sun-Sentinel newspaper in February, included detailed information on the City's webpage and sent letters to a targeted group of individuals to solicit interested applicants to serve on the Public Art Committee. Individuals who submitted applications were invited to attend an information session prior to the regular Public Art Committee meeting scheduled for February 18, 2014. Four applications were received and three individuals chose to attend the session. After careful review of the applications in terms of experience with public art programs, qualifications applicable to the requisite categories and responsibilities the staff and the Public Art Committee are recommending Brian Zambrano be appointed to fill the vacancy. Mr. Zambrano's application is attached. Copies of all applications are on file in the Office of the City Clerk.

<u>Fiscal Impact:</u> The appointment of a regular member to the Public Art Committee presents no fiscal impact to the City.

Recommendation:

I recommend approval of TO 2296 amending Ordinance 2013-16 which adopted the FY 2014 Annual Budget, in the amount of \$23,183,772 from \$130,733,093 to \$153,916,865.

Issue:

On September 19, 2013, the City Commission adopted Ordinance 2013-16 which adopted the annual Operating Budget, Revenues and Expenditures, Capital Budget and Financial Policies for Fiscal Year 2014. Pursuant to Section 166.241(3), a municipality may amend its budget at any time during the course of the year or within 60 days following the end of the fiscal year. In addition, if any fund is increased or decreased then the budget amendment must be adopted in the same manner as the original budget unless otherwise specified in the charter of the respective municipality. The original budget was adopted via ordinance and the City of Tamarac's charter is silent on the subject matter.

Background:

Following is a summary of the recommended adjustments to the Fiscal Year 2014 Budget.

Amendments to the Budget generally reflect actions approved by the City Commission since the budget was adopted but not included in the original budget due to their unknown nature at the time, allocation of encumbrances, i.e. purchases approved in one fiscal year and being paid in the following fiscal year, transfer of funds from a Non-Departmental account to other departments in the General Fund, and items that have been evaluated for recommended inclusion in the current year budget due to updated information, debt issuances and additional capital improvements that have been identified and recommended to be started in the current year due to timing, pricing, etc.

Since the beginning of the fiscal year, the City Commission has approved a number of resolutions that affect the budget for allocation of grant funding, additional funding for certain operating and capital expenditures, executed two utility developer's agreements for Park Place at Woodmont and Chartwell Memory Care, and authorized a contract for the management of Colony West Golf Club and approving certain start-up and capital expenditures for re-opening the club.

The City also issued a \$20 million Taxable Redevelopment Revenue Note, Series 2013 as a line of credit with PNC Bank. The 2013 line of credit replaces and refunded the Taxable Redevelopment Note, Series 2011 as well as refunding expenditures paid in previous years for the development and redevelopment of Tamarac Village. The line of credit bears a variable interest rate equal to one (1) month LIBOR rate plus 1.10% per annum which is 0.25% less than the 2011. Included in this budget amendment is the debt proceeds and offsetting expenses, increasing the budget by \$16,620,000, or 71.7% of the amendment.

In addition, as noted above, one grant was approved in the amount of \$17,157 for the reallocation of unused or reimbursed funds for the CDBG Program from prior years. Also, a number of items have been evaluated for inclusion in the amendment and are enumerated below.

General Fund adjustments to the budget include the following:

- ➤ Transferring the budget for encumbrances from non-departmental to the departmental budgets to which they apply in the amount of \$219,870. In addition, at the end of the year additional encumbrances that exceeded the original estimate of \$175,769, were rolled into FY 2014 and require adjustments to the departmental budgets with an offsetting decrease in contingency.
- ➤ Increasing Human Resources for the acquisition of a LiveScan Fingerprint Station with camera in the amount of \$17,000 for the purposes of doing regular and level 2 employee background checks. This acquisition is offset by a donation of \$3,000 from the P.A.R.O.T. Foundation and a decrease in Non-departmental Contingency budget.
- ➤ Increase Department of Community Development's Budget in the amount of \$150,000 for the purpose of funding a comprehensive re-write of the City's Land Development Regulations and an update of the City's Comprehensive Plan to fully facilitate and implement the findings and recommendations of the

- Commercial Arterial and Redevelopment Studies. The funding for this recommended item is from the Non-Departmental Contingency budget.
- ➤ Increase Public Services Department Budget in the amount of \$141,362 to fund, on a partial year, the cost of two additional crews and associated operating expenses for the Curbing and Sidewalk Pressure Cleaning program. The funding for this request is from the Non-Departmental Contingency budget
- ➤ Increase transfers out from the Non-Departmental budget in the amount of 1,500,000 to the Golf Course Fund for the purpose of funding the start-up expenses, equipment acquisition, various improvements to the club house, cart barn, maintenance building and other parts of the course, and for golf carts. This is offset by an appropriation from fund balance.
- Decrease the general fund revenue in the amount of \$21,391 as a result of corrections to the PILOT (payments in lieu of taxes) revenue from the Stormwater and Utilities funds.

Fire Rescue Fund adjustment to the budget includes the following:

Increase revenues and expenditures in the amount of \$2,500 for the Florida Municipal Insurance Trust Matching Safety Grant Fund program.

Law Enforcement Trust Fund adjustment to the budget includes the following:

➤ Increase revenues and expenditures for an encumbrance in the amount of \$10,000 representing the remaining amount appropriated in FY 2013 for additional specialized training.

Golf Course Fund adjustments to the budget includes the following:

- ➤ Increase revenues and expenditures in the amount of \$1,956,710 representing the first year budget for the Colony West Golf Club.
- ➤ Increase transfer in and capital and other non-operating expenditures in the amount of \$1,500,000 representing the transfer in from the general fund for one-time expenditures for capital equipment, start-up expenses, and various improvements to the golf course facilities in supporting the effort to re-open Colony West Golf Course.

Stormwater Fund adjustment to the budget includes the following:

Increase operating expenses, capital outlay and increase appropriation for net assets in the amount of \$116,304 for encumbrances brought forward from FY 2013 for contracts entered into in FY 2013 and completed in FY 2014.

Utilities Fund adjustment to the budget includes the following:

➤ Increase CIAC (Contribution in Aid of Construction) Revenue and Reserves reflecting Utility Development agreements for Park Place at Woodmont, \$86,500 and Chartwell Memory Care, \$31,200.

Internal Service Funds adjustments to the budget include the following:

Pursuant to R-2013-121, the Risk Fund is transferring \$650,000 from the Risk Fund to the Health Insurance Fun in support of Health Care Claims for calendar year 2014 as a result in reserve requirements in the second year of the contract. It is anticipated that these funds will be recovered over the remainder of the contract.

Personnel adjustments to the budget include the following:

- Increase Public Services Department Increase budget to reflect two additional Groundskeeper II positions for the Curb and Sidewalk Pressure Cleaning Program. As noted above, this will be offset by a decrease in Non-Departmental Contingency.
- ➤ Building Department Increase budget to reflect one full-time Structural Inspector in the amount of \$61,792 representing 8 months projection offset by an increase in appropriation from fund balance.

The Attachments to the budget amendment provide detailed information for all adjustments included in the amendment. Specifically, Attachment A provides the information regarding increases and decreases as well as the amended budget amount with a reference to Attachment B that provides the detail associated with each adjustment. A presentation will be made supporting the recommended adjustments.

Recommendation: The Director of Community Development recommends that the Mayor and City Commission adopt on First Reading the proposed text amendments to Chapter 24, Article III, Division 13 of the City's Code of Ordinances, entitled "Recreational District", at its April 9, 2014 meeting and on Second Reading at its April 23, 2014 meeting.

<u>Issue:</u> The permitted uses enumerated in the Recreational District (S-1), under Section 24-308, Chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances is not consistent with the allowable uses contained in the underlying Recreation land use designation of the City's adopted Comprehensive Plan. The Recreation land use designation of the Future Land Use Element of the Comprehensive Plan specifically allows "educational and civic facilities" which are not supported by the existing S-1 zoning designation. As such, the Community Development Department proposes to amend Chapter 24, specifically Division 13, of the City Code of Ordinances to establish public and private elementary, middle and high schools in the S-1 zoning district, consistent with the permissible uses allowed under the Recreation land use of the City's Comprehensive Plan.

<u>Background:</u> The City's Land Development Regulations is antiquated and outdated with portions not updated since 1975. Several key components of the Land Development Regulations, such as uses and height of buildings are not consistent with the intent and purpose of the Comprehensive Plan. Staff has systematically, where applicable, brought portions of the Code before the City Commission for revision in an effort to maintain consistency with the Comprehensive Plan.

The proposed amendment to establish public and private elementary, middle and high schools in the R-1 district will provide consistency with the Comprehensive Plan which currently allows educational and civic facilities in the underlying Recreation land use category. In addition, the current height restriction of four (4) stories contained in the existing S-1 district is not compatible with new urban designs relative to height, which are typical for elementary, middle and high schools.

<u>Analysis:</u> The following summarizes the proposed changes in the Legislative Draft Ordinance (attached):

<u>Section 24-307 Purpose and characteristics</u> - This portion of the proposed ordinance adds "schools" as one of the functional characteristics of the S-1 zoning district.

<u>Section 9-24-308 Permitted uses</u> – This section of the existing code was amended to add public and private elementary, middle and high schools as a special exception use on properties greater than 6.5 acres, with an underlying land use designation of Recreation, in the S-1 zoning district. The addition of the new use brings this section into compliance with the supporting uses of the Recreation Land Use designation of the Comprehensive Plan which allows educational and civic facilities as allowable uses in the Recreation land use category.

<u>9-24-310 – Landscaping</u> – This section was amended to include the standard requirement for special exception applications seeking relief under the code to provide for compliance with the City's landscaping and vehicular code, to the greatest extent possible.

<u>Section 24-311 – Height of buildings and structures</u> – This Section was amended to provide a height restriction of six (6) stories as opposed to four (4) which is more consistent with new urban designs of middle and high school buildings that are being built on smaller land areas.

<u>Summary of Recommendation:</u> Staff recommends that the Mayor and City Commission adopt on First Reading the proposed text amendments to the City's Code of Ordinances. The proposed Recreational District amendment is consistent with City of Tamarac Comprehensive Plan Future Land Use Element Policy 1.2a, by bringing the uses permitted in the zoning district into strict compliance with the allowable uses of the Recreation underlying land use designation. The proposed code amendment also supports the City's Strategic Goal #5 "A Vibrant Community" by addressing the compatibility of the zoning code with the City's Comprehensive Plan.

Fiscal Impact: There will be no direct budgetary impact.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF TAMARAC. FLORIDA AMENDING CHAPTER 24 OF THE CITY'S CODE OF ORDINANCES, ENTITLED "ZONING" BY AMENDING ARTICLE III, DIVISION 13 ENTITLED "RECREATIONAL DISTRICT" BY SPECIFICALLY AMENDING SECTION 24-307 ENTITLED "PURPOSE AND CHARACTERISTICS", AMENDING SECTION 24-308 ENTITLED "PERMITTED USES", AMENDING SECTION 24-310 ENTITLED "LANDSCAPING", AMENDING SECTION ENTITLED "HEIGHT OF BUILDINGS OR STRUCTURES" TO ESTABLISH PUBLIC OR PRIVATE ELEMENTARY, MIDDLE OR HIGH SCHOOL AS A SPECIAL EXCEPTION USE IN THE S-1 ZONING DISTRICT IN CONFORMITY WITH THE CITY OF TAMARAC COMPREHENSIVE PLAN; **PROVIDING** CODIFICATION; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICTS; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Tamarac (the "City") seeks to amend its regulations to establish public or private elementary, middle or high school as a special exception use in the Recreational Zoning District (R-1); and

WHEREAS, Policy 1.2a of the Future Land Use Element of the City's Comprehensive Plan allows educational facilities as a permitted use in the corresponding Recreation Land Use designation; and

WHEREAS, the City recognizes that the uses enumerated in S-1 zoning district under Section 24-308 of the City Code is not consistent with the allowed uses in the Recreation Land Use designation of the Comprehensive Plan; and

WHEREAS, the City Commission finds that amending the code to establish public and private elementary, middle or high school in the R-1 zoning district is consistent with the goals, objectives and policies of the Comprehensive Plan;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF TAMARAC, FLORIDA, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The foregoing recitals are hereby ratified and confirmed as being true and correct and are hereby made a specific part of this Ordinance upon adoption hereof.

SECTION 2. Chapter 24, Article III, Division 13, Section 24-307 entitled "Purposes and characteristics" of the City of Tamarac Code of Ordinances is hereby amended as follows:

Sec. 24-307. – Purposes and characteristics.

The S-1 recreational district is intended for outdoor sports and recreational activities in which participants may be actively or passively engaged. The activities for which the S-1 district is provided are normally and primarily conducted in the open air, while related accessory uses may be in the open air or in a building or structure. The functional characteristics of an S-1 district may require its location within, or in close relationship to, residential areas, schools, public recreational areas or scenic areas. Because of the nature of uses involved and the variety of arrangement of uses and facilities on the site plan of development, broad general regulations for plot size, yards, setbacks and height must be adequate for any location at which an S-1 district may be established.

SECTION 3. Chapter 24, Article III, Division 13, Section 24-308 entitled "Permitted uses" of the City of Tamarac Code of Ordinances is hereby amended as follows:

Sec. 24-308. – Permitted uses.

In S-1 districts, no building or structure or part thereof shall be erected, altered or used, or land or water used, in whole or in part, for other than one (1) or more of the following specified uses:

- (1) Public or private country club. A dining room, bar and grill and snack bar may be operated at a public or private country club through special exception approval of the city commission. Such special exception approval shall be consistent with the provisions governing special exceptions as set out in this Code and consistent with the regulations concerning restaurants in section 24-434. No external advertising of the dining room, bar and grill and snack bar shall be permitted.
- (2) Golf course.
- (3) Shuffleboard court.
- (4) Swimming pool.
- (5) Tennis courts.
- (6) Neighborhood or community club operated by nonprofit or public corporation.
- (7) Public parks and open spaces.
- (8) Public and private elementary, middle or high schools on properties greater than 6.5 acres in size with a Land Use designation of "Recreation", subject to the special exception procedures set forth in Chapter 24, Article IV of the City's Code of Ordinances. Private schools shall offer curricula substantially equivalent to public schools of comparable grades and shall meet the academic requirements of the state department of education.

The operation of any recreation area shall, regardless of anything else in this chapter, be subject to the reasonable control and direction of the city and the city commission as regulatory authorities.

SECTION 4. Chapter 24, Article III, Division 13, Section 24-310 entitled "Landscaping" of the City of Tamarac Code of Ordinances is hereby amended as follows:

Sec. 24-310. - Landscaping.

(a) In S-1 districts, all required yards and open spaces adjacent to streets and contiguous to residential property shall be planted and properly maintained with suitable planting in the form of grass, shrubs, hedges and trees to present an attractive appearance appropriate to the neighborhood.

- (b) Any site upon which a golf course is developed shall be landscaped and maintained in a neat and clean, live, healthy and growing condition, properly watered and trimmed, free of any structure, refuse or debris, for a distance of not less than one hundred (100) feet from any abutting property zoned for residential use.
- (c) Any use that seeks relief by a special exception must ensure the following actions are completed or are proposed to be completed through a site plan revision or building permit prior to approval by the city commission:
 - (1) The entire site in which the proposed use is located shall be in compliance with current landscaping requirements to the greatest extent possible as stated in Chapter 11, Landscaping.
 - (2) All vehicular use areas shall be in compliance with current requirements to the greatest extent possible as stated in Chapter 9, Health, Sanitation and Nuisances, Chapter 24, Zoning and in the city's engineering standards.

SECTION 5. Chapter 24, Article III, Division 13, Section 24-311 entitled "Height of buildings or structures" of the City of Tamarac Code of Ordinances is hereby amended as follows:

Sec. 24-311. – Height of buildings or structures.

In S-1 districts, no building or structure, or part thereof, shall be erected or altered to a height exceeding sixty (60) feet. This requirement shall not include wireless or light poles and antennas installed by the city for government use or a city related purpose.

SECTION 6. <u>Codification.</u> It is the intention of the City Commission of the City of Tamarac that the provisions of this Ordinance shall become and be made a part of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Tamarac, Florida, and that the Sections of this ordinance may be renumbered, re lettered and the word "Ordinance" may be changed to "Section", "Article" or such other word or phrase in order to accomplish such intention.

SECTION 7. Conflicts. That all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances, Resolutions or

SECTION 8. Severability. Should any section, provision, paragraph, sentence,

Recommendation:

The Building Department Director recommends approval of the Ordinance amending Chapter 10 of the City's Code of Ordinances, Entitled "Land Development Regulations" by specifically amending Article II, Section 10-1 entitled "Definitions" to define the terms "Development" and "Redevelopment"; specifically amending Article II, Section 10-29 entitled "Formal Application for construction, improvement, development or building permits" to require code compliance prior to the issuance of a building permit for development or re-development.

Issue:

The City of Tamarac should amend Chapter 10, Land Development Regulations" by specifically amending Article II, Section 10-1 entitled "Definitions" to define the terms "Development" and "Redevelopment"; specifically amending Article II, Section 10-29 entitled "Formal Application for construction, improvement, development or building permits" to require code compliance prior to the issuance of a building permit for development or re-development.

Background:

In recent years, the City of Tamarac has experienced an increase in property maintenance and building code violations. The Code Enforcement Division of the Community Development Department has issued an average of 8,850 code violations per year, in addition to an average of 694 building code violations issued by the Building Department. These numbers reflect all violations issued on residential, multi-family and commercial properties in the City.

Due to the increase in Development and Re-development experienced in the City of Tamarac, some of which occurs with outstanding violations on the property, it is the intent of the Building and Community Development Departments to insure that all properties that are pursuing a building permit for Development or Re-development, comply with the requirements of the proposed City Ordinances and the Florida Building Code. The proposed Ordinance will require the property owner or developer to cure any existing code compliance issues or violations on the property or site consistent with the definition in the Ordinance and State Statute for Development and Re-development, prior to the issuance of a building permit.

In addition to the definition of Development as outline in the proposed Ordinance and State Statutes, Redevelopment is defined as: "a substantial change in the use or character of an existing developed property, including, but not limited to, the demolition and

reconstruction of buildings on an existing developed site; or substantial renovations, repairs or improvements of existing buildings or infrastructures in the excess of 50% of the assessed value of the property or structure"

The intent of this revised Ordinance is therefore not directed to a residential or commercial property seeking to do minimal or minor renovations, that have one or multiple building or maintenance code violations, since these properties and the proposed renovations would not fit within the definition of redevelopment. However, any new construction, substantial changes to existing developed property or substantial renovations or improvements in excess of 50% of the assessed value of the property or structure would warrant the Chief Building Official or his designee to require verification in writing from the Code Compliance Manager that the property for which the permit is requested, is in compliance with the City's property maintenance requirements prior to the issuance of the building permit.

Once the proposed Ordinance is approved by the Commission, the Building and Community Development Departments will revise all notifications used in their preliminary meetings with Developers and building site owners in the Development Review Committee (DRC) meetings to make them aware of the new requirements of the Ordinance. By addressing this requirement during the DRC process, developers and owners will be aware early enough in the process before they apply for any type of permit on the site or property. In addition, during the plan review process, they will also be reminded in writing of these requirements.

By requiring code compliance prior to the issuance of a building permit to develop or redevelop a property, it improves the appearance of our communities and the City will serve the best interest of the residents of the City of Tamarac by making sure that the public health, safety, welfare of the community and the built environment is protected. The proposed changes also adheres to Goal #5, of the City' Strategic Plan of having "A Vibrant Community"

Fiscal Impact:

No fiscal impact is anticipated by amending Chapter 10 of the City's Code of Ordinances.

SECTION 10-1 ENTITLED "DEFINITIONS" TO DEFINE THE "DEVELOPMENT" TERMS AND "REDEVELOPMENT": SPECIFICALLY AMENDING ARTICLE II, SECTION ENTITLED "FORMAL APPLICATION FOR CONSTRUCTION, IMPROVEMENT, DEVELOPMENT OR BUILDING PERMITS" TO REQUIRE CODE COMPLIANCE PRIOR TO THE ISSUANCE OF A BUILDING PERMIT FOR **DEVELOPMENT** OR DEVELOPMENT; PROVIDING FOR CODIFICATION; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICTS; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Tamarac (the "City") seeks to ensure that properties within the City are maintained in accordance with the City's general property maintenance standards set forth in the City Code of Ordinances; and

WHEREAS, the failure to maintain property can lead to decline in property value, create attractive nuisances and lead to a general decrease in the neighborhood and community aesthetic; and

WHEREAS, property maintenance is the responsibility of the property owner; and

WHEREAS, Article VIII of the State Constitution and Chapter 166, Florida Statutes, provide that municipalities shall have the governmental, corporate, and proprietary powers to enable them to conduct municipal government, perform municipal functions and render municipal services, and may exercise any power for municipal purposes, except when expressly prohibited by law; and

WHEREAS, the City recognizes the constraints on inspections of buildings, structures, or real property set forth in Section 553.79(17)(a), Florida Statutes; and

WHEREAS, code compliance violations that are readily observable and in plain view, are exempt from the constraints of Section 553.79(17)(a); and

WHEREAS, in addition to code compliance issues at existing properties, the City is experiencing an increase in development and redevelopment proposals, and has observed property maintenance violations, such as outdoor storage of materials and landscape maintenance violations on vacant parcels of land; and

WHEREAS, the Building Department and Community Development Department recommend that a property owner be required to cure existing code compliance issues on the property or site prior to the issuance of a building permit to develop or redevelop a property; and

WHEREAS, requiring code compliance prior to the issuance of a building permit to develop or redevelop a property serves a legitimate public purpose; and

WHEREAS, by requiring code compliance prior to the issuance of a building permit to develop or redevelop, the City will be better able to remedy the current conditions on properties that present a serious threat to the public health, safety and welfare of the community; and

WHEREAS, the City Commission finds that mandating code compliance prior to the issuance of a building permit to develop or redevelop property is in the best interests of the citizens and residents of the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF TAMARAC, FLORIDA, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The foregoing recitals are hereby ratified and confirmed as being

true and correct and are hereby made a specific part of this Ordinance upon adoption hereof.

SECTION 2. Chapter 10, Article II, Section 10-1 entitled "Definitions" of the City of Tamarac Code of Ordinances is hereby amended as follows:

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this chapter, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Abutting property means any property that is immediately adjacent or contiguous to the development.

Bench mark means a securely set concrete or stone monument having a minimum cross-sectional dimension of four (4) inches and a minimum length of twenty-four (24) inches, into which a brass marker has been secured on which its elevation above mean sea level has been stamped or engraved and bearing the registration number of its surveyor or engineer.

Building permit means:

- (1) Any permit for the erection, construction, relocation or demolition of a building required by Florida Building Code, Broward County Amendments, and other regulatory codes of the State of Florida.
 - (2) Any permit for an addition to an existing building which would:
 - a. Create one (1) or more additional dwelling units; or
 - b. Involve a change in the occupancy of a building as described in the Florida Building Code, Broward County Amendments, and other regulatory codes of the State of Florida.

Collector street means a street which, in addition to giving access to abutting properties, carries traffic from minor streets to the major system of arterial streets and highways, including the principal entrance street of a residential development.

Construction or development means any improvement, development or change of the land from its present state, or building, repairing, relocating or demolishing a structure. A permit shall be obtained before any of the above actions or uses are begun.

Developer means a person, or his agent, who is responsible for the planning, subsequent land improvements, or any other development of a parcel of land.

Development means the carrying out of any building activity or mining operation,

the making of any material change in the use or appearance of any structure or land that would impact concurrency public facilities including all acts and activities included in the definition of development set forth in Section 380.04, Florida Statutes, or its successor provision.

Development order means an order issued by the city commission authorizing the granting, denying or granting with conditions of an application for a development permit.

Development permit means any engineering permit, building permit, zoning permit, subdivision or plan approval, site plan approval, rezoning, special exception, variance or other official action of a unit of local government having the effect of permitting the development of land, but does not include any variance or other official action necessary solely for the purpose of issuing a permit, other than a building permit, pursuant to the Florida Building Code, Broward County Amendments, and other regulatory codes of the State of Florida.

Director means the director of the department of community development, or such other person as designated in writing by the city manager.

Engineering drawings, final means drawings, specifications and calculations prepared and sealed by an engineer registered in the state which specifically describes parameters required for construction of all on-site and off-site improvements necessary for the ultimate development of land for the project.

Engineering drawings, schematic means diagram of wastewater collection and transmission, water distribution, storm drainage systems, designating direction of flow and connections with existing facilities, ground floor elevations, fire hydrants and street and parking area paving.

Fire protection water supply, private means water used as part of the fire protection system which is not a part of the potable water supply, but which requires positive pressure from such sources as canals, deep wells or lakes.

Improvements, private means development of the land in private ownership for any use, including without limitation the construction of a golf course, waterway, lake, rockpit, canal, filling, grading, dredging and building and landscaping.

Improvements, public means construction or development work in the public rights-of-way or easements.

Local street means a street used primarily for access to abutting property.

Parcel of land or tract means any quantity of land capable of being described with such definiteness that its location and boundaries may be established, which is designated by its owner or developer as land to be used or developed as a unit or which

has been used or developed as a unit.

Plot plan means a plan indicating identification of lots and blocks or buildings and units in a fee simple subdivision intended for transfer of ownership, use or improvement.

Redevelopment: In addition to the definition of "development" provided in Section 380.04, Fla. Stat., this term shall mean a substantial or material change in the use or character of an existing developed property, including, but not limited to, the demolition and reconstruction of buildings on an existing developed site; or substantial renovations, repairs or improvements of existing buildings or infrastructure in excess of 50% of the assessed value of the property or structure.

Setback means the minimum street front, side or rear yard open space as measured between a building and the boundary lines of the lot on which the building is located, or edge of roadway easement at right angles to the boundary line.

Sidewalk means a pedestrian walkway within the public road right-of-way, easement or on private property.

Site area, gross means the total area of a proposed development, including public rights-of-way. Maximum residential densities are based on this area in relation to permitted density in the city land use element.

Site area, net means the area of the parcel excluding public rights-of-way.

Site development plan concept means an instrument for discussing the feasibility of a proposed project, with minimum drawings required.

Site development plan, final or final site plan means a complete technical submission reviewed by the planning board and approved by the city commission prior to filing for any development permit except as may be excluded in section 10-47.

Site development plan, preliminary or preliminary site plan means a tentative development plan, to scale and dimension, which shall be submitted to and reviewed by the staff prior to submission of final site development plans.

Site development plan, revised means a modification to an approved final site development plan or development order.

Structure means anything built or constructed, installed or portable, the use of which requires a location on a parcel of land, including but not limited to buildings, trailers, fences, swimming pools, poles, pipelines, transmission lines, tracks and advertising signs.

Subdivision means a division of land into one (1) or more lots, parcels or tracts adjacent to a public street or requiring the creation of a new street.

Trafficway means any one (1) of the expressways, principal arterials, minor arterials or collector streets shown on the county trafficways plan, promulgated by the county planning council pursuant to Chapter 59-1154, Laws of Florida, as amended, and the county charter, or any delineated trafficway shown on the county delineated trafficways plan.

SECTION 3. Chapter 10, Article II, Section 10-29 entitled "Formal Application for Construction, Improvement, Development or Building Permits" of the City of Tamarac Code of Ordinances is hereby amended as follows:

Section 10.29 – Formal Application for Construction, Improvement, Development or Building Permits

- (a) The chief building official, upon receiving a request for a permit, shall request verification in writing from the finance director that all applicable fees have been received by the city before issuing any construction, improvement, development or building permit.
- (b) The city engineer and chief building official shall be responsible, before issuing any new permits, to verify that the applications for such permits are for construction and development according to the approved site development plan; and they shall see that either the approved site plan time limit has not expired or that the city commission has granted an extension of time. No permit of any nature shall be issued for development which is inconsistent with approved site development plan or the plat approved by the commission. A requirement for issuance of the first permit shall be the submission of the plats as recorded in the public records of the county.
- (c) The city planner Community Development Department shall be responsible for inspection of the premises to see that the physical site improvements are in conformance with the approved final site development plan and development order prior to the issuance of a certificate of occupancy. No building shall receive a certificate of occupancy until the chief building official certifies that the project is in accordance with the provisions of the South-Florida Building Code, as may be amended (section 307.1) and all other laws and ordinances applicable thereto.
- (d) The chief building official, upon receiving a request for a permit for development or redevelopment of a property or site, shall request verification in writing from the code compliance manager that the property or site, for which the permit is requested, is in compliance with the City's property maintenance requirements set forth in the City's Code of Ordinances. Properties or sites in violation of the City's property maintenance requirements, or with outstanding unresolved code

enforcement violations, or expired permits, shall be required to satisfactorily resolve the violations and close outstanding permits, prior to any new permits being issued to develop or redevelop the property. In the event a permit is applied for to perform phased development/redevelopment or construction on a site, the entire site must be in compliance prior to the issuance of a permit.

SECTION 4. Codification. It is the intention of the City Commission of the City of Tamarac that the provisions of this Ordinance shall become and be made a part of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Tamarac, Florida, and that the Sections of this ordinance may be renumbered, re lettered and the word "Ordinance" may be changed to "Section", "Article" or such other word or phrase in order to accomplish such intention

SECTION 5. Conflicts. That all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances, Resolutions or parts thereof in conflict herewith, be and the same are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

SECTION 6. Severability. Should any section, provision, paragraph, sentence, clause or word of this Ordinance or portion hereof be held or declared by any court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or invalid, in part or application, it shall be considered as eliminated and shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions or applications of this Ordinance.

SECTION 7. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall become effective upon adoption.
